Utah Weed Supervisors Association

For the past several years, the Bear River RC&D has been providing fiscal and contractual services for the Utah Weed Supervisors
Association. Again this year, the UWSA secured funding from the Forest Service and APHIS for weed control. Fifteen Cooperative Weed Management Areas in Utah applied for and benefited from these two funding sources. In 2010, the RC&D administered \$107,715 for the Utah Weed Supervisors Association.



Outreach Tree Program

In 2010, 45 trees were given away to individuals and groups requesting them. The species given were the Walter Cottam hybrid cross (between the English Oak and the cold hardy Mongolian Oak), and Ohio Buckeye.

Bear River RC&D Wilderness Youth Camp



The vault and outhouse were installed on the afternoon of September 30, 2010, by two men utilizing a backhoe to dig a hole for the vault, and a crane to lift the vault and outhouse into place.

Bear River Council is looking forward to offering the Wilderness Youth Camp experience this coming year with the addition of a handicap accessible outhouse and camping pad.

Funding for the outhouse came from a Resource Advisory Grant of \$19,575, which will eventually include the construction of a pad and fully accessible fire ring adjacent to the outhouse.

The three acre campground is located at the summit of Emigration Canyon on the Caribou-Targhee National Forest in Franklin County, Idaho. Located in dense timber (Subalpine Fir, Lodgepole Pine and Englemann Spruce), the camp offers a sizable amphitheater and A-Frame building for group activities, as well as 22 individual campsites with fire rings. During the 2010 season, the USFS installed improvements to help insure a steady supply of culinary water to the camp.

Income generated by 383 users of the camp in 2010 was \$1234.08.
